The Family Preservation Program is highly effective in helping to end the cycle of poverty. What sets this program apart is it's comprehensive nature, which includes four intensive programs that cover eight areas of poverty development. These areas include food security, education, income generation, psycho-social, sanitation & home improvement, health & hygiene, children & elderly, and community development. The program encourages both family and community accountability without relying on hand-outs. It is community-led, and has an exit strategy to prevent dependence. Our future goals include expanding the program to reach even more families and villages. We express our sincere appreciation to our founders, donors, volunteers, and all those who contributed to Care for Life and the development of the Family Preservation Program. Family Preservation Program in Sudan: First Village Community Meeting Held

This milestone is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our US team and in-country partner, Elevate, who worked tirelessly to develop the curriculum, gain necessary government approvals, and prepare the village. Although challenges were faced, we remained resilient and committed to the cause.

University Professors Complete Study Proving Benefits of the Family Preservation Program



At Care for Life, we take pride in our ability to demonstrate progress through the use of data. In 2022, we received the findings of an independent study conducted by Patrick Panos, a professor from the University of Utah, and Professor Angelea Panos, a professor from Utah Valley University. Data Collection Systems Digitized to Ensure Effectiveness and Efficiency

Our staff in Mozambique received training in the new system, which contributed to a seamless transition.








10,336 GOALS ACHIEVED BY OUR FAMILIES.






BY FAMILIES IN THE PROGRAM



Victor and Domingos Miliasse Learn the Skills to Become Self-Reliant

Victor and Domingos Miliasse lived in Matope, Mozambique, until a cyclone destroyed their home. In search of a better life, the couple relocated to the village of Samora Machel with the dream of owning a secure home. Upon arriving in Samora Machel, they learned about Care for Life's Family Preservation Program which promotes self-reliance through skills-based education, family mentoring, goal-setting, and community development.

Victor and Domingos joined the Family Preservation Program with excitement. After attending the program's skills-based community classes, learning about setting goals, and receiving one-on-one mentoring, they gained hope to accomplish their dream of owning a secure home. With the support of Care for Life staff, Victor and Domingos set multiple goals, including building a new concrete house. As they worked towards their goals, they received regular bags of cement as a reward incentive for what they had accomplished. As they began the process of building their home, they combined their own resources with the cement incentives. Over the course of 24 months, Victor and Domingas successfully built a house, painted it and improved their latrine. The couple attributes their newfound happiness to the Family Preservation Program.

One of the key benefits of the program is its emphasis on self-reliance and continued learning. It also encourages participants to pay the things they've learned forward and teach others the skills they've learned. Since building their home, Domingos has been named a zone leader in her community as part of the Family Preservation Program and is responsible for looking after and teaching others in her zone. Additionally, she has continued taking classes and recently completed a business course and is exploring opportunities to start her own business.

The success of families like the Miliasse's are made possible by the generosity of our donors. With your support, Care for Life can continue to empower families across the globe and help them achieve self-reliance.



Care for Life Objectives

The Family Preservation Program (FPP) has a multifaceted approach to help alleviate poverty and build community and family capacity. The program achieves poverty alleviation through skills-based education and family goal-setting. Additionally, the program offers one-on-one family coaching and mentoring, community classes, and community leadership development to help strengthen community capacity. According to the United Nations, capacity building refers to the process of developing and improving the skills, instincts, abilities, processes, and resources that organizations and communities require to thrive in an ever-changing world. CFL measures success in poverty alleviation and capacity building through these six objectives:



Build Family Capital

FPP strengthens family units by encouraging unity, accountability, skill development, creative problem-solving, and collaboration toward common goals.

Build Community Capacity

FPP expand the skills and resources of communities by engaging them in a variety of ways, including community meetings, local leadership development, skills-based community classes, and mentorship programs led by local leaders.





Community Leadership

local leadership is organized and trained to take ownership of the program. This creates accountability, engagement, and collective action, strengthening relationships and networks within the community.

Improve Health

Poverty and ill health are mutually reinforcing. CFL is dedicated to breaking this cycle by teaching essential life skills. From sanitation and mosquito mitigation to gardening, we empower communities with the knowledge they need.
